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Moving The LCS Network Forward Despite Challenges



The COVID-19 pandemic and instability in Haiti have made travel and other activities in the country considerably more challenging, causing many activities to take much longer than usual. Nevertheless, The Haitian Project (THP) continues to push steadily forward with the creation of The Louverture Cleary Schools (LCS) Network, a national system of 10 top-notch, tuition-free, Catholic secondary boarding schools stretching across the country.

Building on the decades-long success of LCS Santo 5, each new school in the Network will be established in a different diocese/ department of Haiti, increasing access to quality education outside of the nation's capital.

The importance of this undertaking has only been made clearer by the COVID -19 pandemic. In a country that has just one-tenth the number of doctors per capita as the United States, 25 percent of LCS graduates go on to pursue careers in medicine.

Working with diocesan and private sector partners in Haiti, THP and Fondation Haitian Project (FHP), THP's partner foundation in Haiti, have located viable sites for the next



three schools: one each in the northern peninsula, central plateau, and southern peninsula regions. FHP is currently working out details on the leases or title transfers for these properties.

Committed to the Value of Education: LCS Looks Ahead After State Exams

In Haiti, each school year is punctuated by two state exams: the exam required for *Katryèm* (US 9th grade) students to advance from the fundamental curriculum to the secondary, and the Baccalaureate exam required for *Philo* (US 12th grade +1) students to officially complete secondary school and apply to university.

While these exams are usually held

in July, this year they were delayed until October when schools completed the 2019-2020 school year, which had been interrupted by frequent political unrest and then by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Having already met the Ministry of Education's abbreviated 2019-2020 school day requirement, Louverture Cleary School Santo 5 (LCS) was able to spend the summer and early fall looking ahead to the new academic year instead of wrapping up the last one. The school's administration focused on the meticulous planning necessary for the school's eventual reopening, made considerably more complex by LCS being one of the few boarding schools in Haiti.

The school hosted the *Katryèm* class and the 2020 *Philo* graduates separately for a week of exam prep and then again during their actual exam periods. Having only one class on campus at a time allowed for necessary hygienic practices and social distancing while providing the students with important final instruction in a focused environment with reliable electricity and nutrition.

Louverturian's Success Highlights LCS's Excellence

Louverture Cleary School students and graduates are known as Louverturians because they embody the values of the school community: working hard, placing others before themselves, and committing to building a brighter future for their country. A recent success of graduate Lyncée Charles (LCS '20) highlighted this work ethic while once again showing that LCS students receive an outstanding education at one of the top schools in Haiti.

After the COVID-19 pandemic brought her final year at LCS to a halt in March, Lyncée and her peers had to return home to quarantine and continue their studies in alternate ways. While looking for ways to stay engaged and active during this challenging time, Lyncée discovered that a Haitian cultural institution, the Centre Muse Haïti, was holding a national essay competition about the COVID-19 pandemic.

In response to one of five possible prompts, Lyncée wrote an essay addressing the mistrust and skepticism many Haitians feel toward their government and whether this mistrust permits citizens to disregard the government's pandemic response policies. She reflected on how the people of Haiti may distrust the state because of corruption, lack of transparency, and a lack of support for even the basic needs of the population living in poverty.

In spite of these challenges, true to her Louverturian formation, her essay remained focused on the path forward, concluding that the seriousness of the virus

and the importance of the protocols implemented should rise above negative feelings toward the Haitian government. This, she reasoned, was imperative to protect the health and well-being of Haitians and to not create another tragedy for an already suffering people.

After LCS Principal Marjorie Mombrun (LCS '07) was informed in September that Lyncée had placed in the top ten entries in the country, they attended a socially-distanced award ceremony to learn that Lyncée

had placed third overall in the national contest!

Principal Mombrun reflects, "I am proud of Lyncée. She decided on her own to participate in the competition and was awarded third place. Once again, LCS is top in the country, proof that our students receive a great education. It elevates the reputation of the school and reminds everyone that LCS aims for excellence."

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the construction of the Model Campus, which can then be replicated across Haiti. While LCS's flagship school at Santo 5 in Port-au-Prince represents a model educational program, its physical plant grew and adapted over the years to fit the confines of the property. The Model Campus addresses this issue as an easily-replicated, safe and constructive environment for the formation of Haiti's future leaders that expands upon LCS's legacy of environmental stewardship through innovative green technologies.

Work is expected to begin on the Model Campus at one of the three locations in the coming months. Enthusiasm for The LCS Network in Haiti could not be higher. Once it is safe to resume more frequent travel within the country, the search for the remaining locations will progress with the help and support of Haiti's Bishops, all of whom have expressed great enthusiasm for the Network.

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
Mission Statement
